October 2nd, 2019 marks the 150th birth anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi. And, the day India is set to reach its ambitious goal of achieving an open-defecation free society through the construction of over 100 million toilets in the past 5 years. However, not all toilets are connected to sewers, and not all sewers are connected to treatment plants. This results in the necessity of manual and mechanized labor in completing the sanitation service chain. Although direct contact with fecal waste through 'manual scavenging' is legally prohibited since 1993, the practice is still prevalent. The exhibited photo essays by Sharada Prasad and Isha Ray focus on the back-end of the sanitation chain, and bring to light the plight of those who have to fill in, where there are no sewers.
